Is it possible that I can know God?

Really knowing who God is

Having knowledge about God is very valuable and useful.

It means that we are better informed so that we can listen more carefully to what people say about God and know whether what they are saying is right or not. But, as we have seen already, we are to know God for ourselves, and have a personal relationship with Him, rather than simply know about Him.

We have also seen in a previous study the essential role that Jesus Christ shares in our knowing God. Also, how we can only have a relationship with God by being forgiven of our sins – which is something Jesus Christ alone can do for us through His death upon the cross.

We could also say that everything we know about God is meant to make us worshippers of God.

Look up John 4 vv.23-24 and write in the space what this has to say:

When we have repented of our sin and have believed on Jesus Christ and His saving work on the cross, then we have a living relationship with God and have become true worshippers and servants of God.

A worshipper wants to be ruled by God

Some people want to do things entirely their own way. They do not wish anyone to have any authority over them. This is not so for the Christian and the true worshipper of God.

The lesson of Study Three was that God is sovereign. Jesus Christ, as our Saviour, is also to be our Lord. The truth is we cannot receive Jesus Christ as our Saviour until we recognise Him as Lord.

In practical terms this means that when we do recognise Him as Lord and Saviour we shall, with the Holy Spirit's help, become more and more like Him. For example, we will want to have more love and more holiness. For these are two qualities that especially characterise God – just as Studies Five and Six showed us.

Look up and write down Hebrews 12 v.14:
Read through Matthew 5 vv.3-10, the 'beatitudes' in the Sermon on the Mount. Write down verse 8:
Next read through 1 Corinthians 13 vv.1-7 to see what Paul says about the importance of love in the life of a believer. Write down verse 4:

We will want all that we do, and all that we have, to be under the government and rule of God. We must do it everything in our lives according to the will of God, whether it is how we conduct ourselves in our families, or with our friends and neighbours, or in our places of work. Even though we may fail as we seek to obey the Lord and become like Him, it is the still the true desire of every worshipper to change and have a transformed life, to live as citizens of God's kingdom, under His government.

A worshipper is a praying person
The person who puts their trust in the Lord Jesus Christ recognises that prayer is important. For the desire to pray is close to the heart of every worshipper of God. Prayer is the way they come to know God better after they have been converted. Read Matthew 6 vv.9-13, the Lord's Prayer, to see how the Lord Jesus Christ taught His disciples to pray.
Paul thought prayer was important. Write down the vital instructions Paul gives in 1 Thessalonians 5 v.17:
What does Paul have to say about prayer in Colossians 4 v.2?
A worshipper is a person who is ready and willing to pray. Prayer is in part a confession that we believe God to be sovereign and powerful. It is in prayer that we submit to God's will and respond to His love.
A worshipper is a lover of God's Word
The Bible is the place where God has revealed Himself to us and shown us what He is like and who He is. So then a worshipper will be a person who loves the Word of God. Psalm 119 describes a healthy attitude of love and respect towards the Word of God.
Look up Psalm 119 v.16 and write the verse in the space:
Another example is Psalm 119 v.24. Write that one down as well:
With the help of the Holy Spirit, we learn how the Scriptures teach us more about God's will. The Scriptures bring us into closer touch with

God's thinking on what we should believe and how we should live. We then show that we know God by the lives we lead.
See what the psalmist says in Psalm 119 v.11:
A worshipper of God loves the people of God
A wordingpor or dod loves the people of dod
To know who God is means that we also love His people. The apostle John takes this up in his first letter.
Look up and note down 1 John 4 v.20:
Thus one of the ways that we can see and everyone else can see we know and love God is that we have love for His people. It is God's will that knowing Him should not just have a personal dimension but that we should grow in our knowledge of Him with other believers. We do this by joining together with other believers. We benefit by being together, praying together, working together, sharing together and learning together.
In one sense all believers belong to the church of the Lord Jesus Christ because the true church is made up of every single believer who is alive at any given time (the universal church). But God intends that people specifically express their worship together by being part of the local church. So part of the answer to the question 'Who is God?' is that He is the one who has called people together to be part of the church. Joining the local church is the practical expression and recognition of our being part of the universal church.
Look up 1 Corinthians 12 vv.12-18 and see the lesson it has there about the importance of being together in the church, the body of Christ. Write down verse 13:

God is to be worshipped
Part of the life of being in the church is that believers are involved in telling others who God is and calling on them to become followers of Jesus Christ.
Look up Matthew 28 vv.19-20 and fill in the space:
When we understand who God is, then we obey Him and follow His instruction as to how to live as His people, whether in our individual life of holiness, or together as His people in the church.
It is a tragedy, and also very wrong, when people say they know who God is but then show that they do not take Him seriously because they live such unholy lives or display such little love in their hearts. People will recognise that we know God because of what we believe about Him and how we live as a result.
Really knowing who God is will make us worshippers of God.
Finally write down how the apostle John turned his knowledge of God to worship in Revelation chapter 1 beginning with the last part of verse 16 and going into verse 17:

Some questions to ask

Do I simply *know about* God or do I really *know* God?

What evidence is there in my life that I have come to know God?

Ephesians 4 v.17–5 v.7

1 Corinthians 12 vv.12-31
